
Just Farmers March 16, 2019

"Learn and Build" describes the bluebird (and swallow) nesting workshop led by John Franken, local bird expert, held at Round Lake Hall on March 16, 2019.

More than forty adults and children attended the event, sponsored by Chickadee Acres Bed and Breakfast and Eskerhazy Farm.

Attenders learned through photos and tales about how Mr. Franken first awoke to the creation as a child and how—at one pivotal moment—he was led to see just how significant "beholding" birds was: more important than even a wall slightly out of level.

We saw photos of habitat, enemies of mountain bluebirds and tree swallows, saw photos of the babies at different stages of development, where to place boxes in ideal habitat, and many more things.





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After hearing interesting stories and facts—"Did you know that tree swallows will grab feathers out of the air to line their nests?" "Did you know that some black bears actually get into the habit of wrecking birdhouses in order to get at the young birds?"—we had a snack and then . . .
